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New UNF Poll Shows Overwhelming Support for Half-Cent Sales Tax for Schools Overwhelming Majority Support Decriminalization of Recreational Marijuana in Duval

The Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida released a new poll comprised of registered voters in Duval County that reveals approximately 74% of Duval County voters support a half-cent sales to upgrade, improve and replace aging schools throughout the school district. Only 20% are against the sales tax, with 4% stating they don't know. Support was highest among Democrats, while still showing strong support among Republicans, with 78% and 68% respectively. A referendum to vote on this sales tax was withdrawn by the Jacksonville City Council in September, which resulted in the Duval County School Board filing a lawsuit against the City of Jacksonville.

"This is the continuation of a trend we've seen during polling on this issue several times this year," said Dr. Michael Binder, faculty director of the PORL at UNF. "Duval registered voters are very supportive of the half-cent sales tax and if given the opportunity to vote, would likely pass this measure easily."

When asked about job approval for the Superintendent of Duval County Public Schools (DCSP), 44% approve of the job Diana Greene is doing as Superintendent, while 28% disapprove. Subsequently, respondents were informed that currently, the Superintendent is a position appointed by the Duval County School Board. When asked if the position should remain appointed, or if the Superintendent should be elected by Duval County voters, the majority stated the position should be elected, at 70%. Conversely, 25% stated the position should continue to be appointed.

"Generally speaking, voters are inclined to support opportunities to vote for both issues and candidates," Binder said. "The superintendent position seems similar, and even though Jacksonville's City Council was divided on the measure, there appears to be support for turning the DCPS superintendent into an elected position."

Crime remains the most important issue facing Jacksonville according to registered voters for the fifth year in a row, at 44%. Education is a distant second, with 13%, followed by

downtown redevelopment at 9%. Mayor Lenny Curry's job approval is at 47%, with 29% disapproving. Jacksonville City Council received 36% approval and 38% disapproval. A majority of respondents approve of how Mike Williams is handling his job as the Sheriff of Jacksonville, at 54%, while 31% disapprove.

"Per the usual here in Jacksonville, crime is the leading concern in the county," Binder noted. "Both Mayor Curry, who was elected by running on reducing crime, and Sheriff Williams have net positive support – though Williams' net positive support is 7 points higher."

Respondents were also asked about other potential policy issues for Duval county. Voters are split concerning the ban of single-use plastic straws in restaurants and retailers, with 42% in support of the ban and 47% in opposition. This policy is split along party lines with 49% of Democrats supporting the measure, while only 30% of Republicans are in favor of the ban. On the other hand, voters strongly support decriminalizing recreational marijuana, with 75% approval. Democrats have higher levels of support, 78%, but a majority of Republicans support decriminalization as well, at 67%.

"Similar to previous polls, marijuana legalization is extremely popular in Duval County," said Binder. "This issue has not gotten very far in City Council, but it is an issue that resonates with the populace."

## <u>Methodology</u>

The UNF Jax Speaks Poll was conducted and sponsored by the Public Opinion Research Lab at the University of North Florida, from Thursday, Oct. 31, 2019, through Monday, Nov. 4, 2019, by live callers via the telephone; calls were made from 4 to 9 p.m. daily, with a maximum of five callbacks attempted. Interviews were conducted in English by UNF undergraduate students and employees. Data collection took place at the PORL facility with its 27-station Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. The phone numbers used for this survey were sourced from the Tuesday, Sept. 10, 2019, update of the Florida Voter File. The sample frame was comprised of registered Florida voters who reside in Jacksonville. Overall, there were 665 completed surveys of Florida registered voters, 18 years of age or older.

The margin of sampling error for the total sample is +/- 3.8 percentage points. The breakdown of completed responses on a landline phone to a cell phone was 17% to 84%. Through hand dialing, an interviewer upon reaching the individual as specified in the voter file asked that respondent to participate, regardless of landline telephone or cell phone. Data were then weighted by partisan registration, age, race, sex and education. Education weights were created from the 2017 American Community Survey (ACS). Partisan registration, sex, race and age weights were created from the Tuesday, Sept. 10, 2019, update of the Florida Voter File to match the active registered voters in Florida. These demographic characteristics were pulled from the voter file list.

All weighted demographic variables were applied using the SPSS version 25 rake weighting function, which won't assign a weight if one of the demographics being weighted on is missing. In this case, respondents missing a response for education were given a weight of 1. There were no statistical adjustments made due to design effects. This study had a 14.4% response rate. The American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Response Rate 3 (RR3) calculation was used which consists of an estimate of what proportion of cases of unknown eligibility are truly eligible. This survey was sponsored by the UNF PORL and directed by Dr. Michael Binder, UNF associate professor of political science.

The PORL is a full-service survey research facility that provides tailored research to fulfill each client's individual needs from political, economic, social and cultural projects. The PORL opened in 2001 and is an independent, non-partisan center, a charter member of the American Association for Public Opinion Research Transparency Initiative and a member of the Association of Academic Survey Research Organization. As members of AAPOR, the PORL's goal is to support sound and ethical practices in the conduct of survey and public opinion research.
